

Texas Juvenile Probation Commission Diversionary Grant Fiscal Year 2008

Amounts will be distributed throughout the year on a quarterly basis.

GRANT U

Top Five Urban Counties:

Travis	\$225,000	to expand existing substance abuse treatment and academic instruction for youth who might otherwise be placed in secure placement
Harris	\$225,000	to provide intensive community based services using the wraparound model to high risk juveniles.
Bexar	\$225,000	to provide intensive, integrated, intervention and prevention in-home family services to offenders at risk of serious, violent or chronic delinquent behaviors.
Tarrant	\$225,000	to develop and provide and Intensive Community Based Program for juvenile offenders who primarily are adjudicated for misdemeanor offenses and also intend to serve other offenders who they determine can benefit from the program model.
Dallas	\$225,000	to expand the evidence based family preservation program and home detention supervision program. The program will offer intensive, comprehensive treatment to youth and families.

Bottom Six Urban Counties:

Counties eligible to apply: Cameron, Collin, Denton, El Paso, Fort Bend, and Hidalgo. All counties applied except Collin.

Cameron	\$62,500	to provide intervention/prevention services to juveniles under misdemeanor probation.
El Paso	\$62,500	to enhance the SHOCAP program which provides supervision and criminal suppression by utilizing principles of community policing and gang suppression.
Denton	\$75,000	will operate school based, intensive case management and mentoring programs to provide prevention and intervention activities and services for students engaging in negative behaviors that lead to participation in the juvenile justice system and/or school drop out.

GRANT K

Regional:

Jefferson, Orange and Hardin \$50,000 with a 50% local match

programs will consist of a combination of strength based wraparound services combined with the intensive supervision and support provided by locally trained, skilled adult advocate, juvenile probation officers, the juvenile offender and his/her family.
